

The Svensk Hyllningsfest honors Swedish ancestors, folk dancing, arts & crafts, and food. Once again food demonstrations at this year's event will feature Swedish delicacies served at Swedish Smörgåsbords or in the homes of the ancestors of the Swedish emigrants who came to the Smoky Valley in the 1860's or later. The demonstrations will include kaffe—egg coffee served at potlucks; potatis korv, a tasty blend of meats, potatoes and spices; pannkakor—much loved Swedish pancakes; rågbröd, a sweet and flavorful rye bread; spritsar and pepparkakor, cookies traditionally available at Christmas; and kringlor, a favorite coffee accompaniment. These demonstrations will be held in the Bank of America community room on Saturday, October 10 before (at 9:00 a.m.) and hourly after the parade. Look for the signs which will give additional information.

Diane Cummings and Janet Monson are the food demonstration co-chairs this year. Diane will show how to make spritz, rye bread and potato sausage. Janet will help Diane with the potato sausage and will also explain how to make pepparkakor, which she says are better than Anna's and cheaper. Kathryn Frantz will again share Swedish coffee traditions. Carla Wilson will make the pastry, kringlor. This year's Hyllningsfest king and former Lindsborg mayor, Don Anderson and his sister Jeanette Shogren, will be demonstrating a crowd favorite, Swedish pancakes.

The schedule is as follows:

- 9:00 a.m.—Kaffe, Swedish coffee traditions
- 12:00 p.m.—Pepparkakor and spritsar, Swedish spice cookies and spritz
- 1:00 p.m.—Rågbröd, Swedish rye bread
- 2:00 p.m.—Pannkakor, Swedish pancakes
- 3:00 p.m.—Potatiskorv, Swedish potato sausage
- 4:00 p.m.—Kringlor, Swedish pastry

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
